Academic Excellence

HSC Results

Analysis has demonstrated that an overwhelming majority of boys from The Scots College have significantly exceeded academic expectations when School Certificate performance is compared to Higher School Certificate (HSC) performance.

In 2014, 166 students completed their HSC. When analysed across the entire HSC group, 65 percent of all results were awarded in the top two Bands (Bands 5 and 6). This means that nearly two thirds of all results were in the top 20 percent of the state. Proportion of boys awarded Band 5 and 6 by subject

NAPLAN Results

Scots Year 3 and Year 5 boys achieved encouraging results for their 2014 National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests. Students are placed in one of six bands and our boys achieved the following results:

There are different options for schools to take when approaching NAPLAN testing. One is to teach to the test with a concentration of time and energy limited to the completion of specific test material. The other is to provide a comprehensive approach to learning that will encompass the wider scope of learning experience possible for children. At Scots we choose the latter and are very pleased with the progress and development of our boys, which becomes evident in NAPLAN-style testing.

The Scots College Prep and Senior Snowsports teams defended their Australian Championship titles during the last Snowsports season.

The Snowsports teams' performance during the Championships resulted in the College winning the 2014 SSA Snowsports School Club of the Year Award in May.

The Prep team achieved first place in both the Sydney division and NSW Interschool Snowsports Championships. At the Australian Interschools Snowsports Championships the boys won for the eighth consecutive year – an unprecedented achievement.

The Senior School team succeeded in defending their championship title in the Sydney and New South Wales divisions. The boys competed against 150 schools to claim the National Championship title for the seventh consecutive year.

Staffing Excellence

If You Want to be a Good Leader, How You Think is Important!

Understanding how leaders think and the type of leadership style they use matters deeply at Scots, as we seek to develop 'Leadership through teams in a spirit of service, compassion, fun and community'.

Building on his extensive research into transformational leadership, cognitive information-processing systems and coaching, Dr Tom Cerni, Head of Counselling Services, has been examining the relationship between the way school leaders think according to the Cognitive-Experiential Theory (CET) and student learning outcomes. In a recent study published in the *Journal of School Leadership*, Dr Cerni and his colleagues found that school principals who indicated a preference for the rational system and conscientiousness, a subscale of behavioural coping, were found to have a significant positive connection with student learning outcomes. They also found that school leaders who experience satisfaction with their work, while being focused on doing things better, seem to inspire others to do more than they originally intended and more than they thought possible. Understanding the way school leaders think according to CET – at whatever level they lead – appears to be a key element in improving student learning outcomes and developing cultures of excellence.
