

HSC Results

We had an exponential increase in the number of academic achievements across Years 7 to 12, proof that Scots boys can and will continue to succeed in their academic pursuits despite any obstacle.

With Music 1, Music 2, Music Extension and Visual Arts all achieving 100 percent Band 5 and 6s; Drama and Design and Technology achieving 75 percent Band 5 and 6s, along with a record number of ARTEXPRESS, ENCORE, OnSTAGE and Shape nominations received in the history of the College; this year has been a resounding success for the Creative Arts Departments.

This year saw the highest number of High Distinctions and Distinctions awarded for for the Science Olympiad than ever before, and the highest number of students sitting those exams. We had boys sit the National Latin Exam with several boys awarded at the highest level. Our Mathematics students had enormous success in the Australian Mathematics Competition, with two boys invited to attend the Australian Mathematical Olympiad Committee's School of Excellence in 2021.

Over 50 students from Years 7 to 12 completed their Honours Capstone Project. Five boys were awarded a Renaissance Man badge.



Extension 2 English Continues to Excel

The Extension 2 English course provides a unique opportunity for select students to research and compose an extensive Major Work in a literary medium of their choosing. Students in the course "master skills of composition" and "develop deep knowledge [in] areas of interest independently" – valuable precursors to tertiary study. It truly is one of the most challenging and rewarding offerings of the HSC, as it requires a rigorous academic process whilst also encouraging scholarly flair and an individual voice.

Scots has enjoyed enviable results in this course. Over the past five years, 90 percent of our cohorts have achieved results in the top two bands. Two of these students have also been included in the New South Wales Education Standards Authority's (NESA) annual publication of the best pieces in the state, the Young Writers Showcase. This is a testament to our participating students who have taken up the challenge with relish, and also to our English staff who possess an intimate understanding of the HSC standards. They use this deep knowledge to offer the best assistance to our students each year.

Artworks Selected for ARTEXPRESS 2021

Each year, approximately 10,000 students elect to study Visual Arts for the New South Wales HSC. The most outstanding Bodies of Work are nominated by HSC markers and, of these, around 300 students' artworks are chosen for exhibition in the ARTEXPRESS showcase in galleries throughout Australia.

In 2020, seven Scots boys' Bodies of Work were preselected and four were chosen for exhibition. This result is a testament to the culture of diligence amongst the students.

During the year, students created artworks that utilised a wide range of mediums and techniques, deeply exploring the gamut of human experience: from sentimental academic drawings of war veterans to the 'sculpting' of a virtual reality environment that explored the dystopic cultural responses to COVID-19; from lenticular prints of digital drawings representing an age-defying transition from human to cyborg to complex tonal rendering with textas, challenging the myths of an Australian identity.



Jack Smoker, Mortality Painting, New England Regional Art Museum

Jack has presented a sequence of large-scale photorealist portraits tracking the transitions between a boy, a man and a cyborg. The sequential nature of the imagery and the utilisation of lenticular printing elaborates on the complex symbolism, creating significant references about the nature of ageing in a post-human context.



Noah White, City of Clay Ceramics, Virtual Exhibition

Noah's Body of Work combines many different visual codes and conventions, presenting objects related to fantasy, gaming sets, decorative artists and dwellings as aesthetic ceramic forms. This piece shows a strong degree of control in the building of the forms, treatment of the surfaces, and the decoration and colour scheme which add to its complexity.



William Goddard, Time Time Based Media, Margaret Whitlam Galleries

Williams's submission is a poetic documentary that explores the construct of time from the perspective of three different subjects. The non-linear sequence of various B-roll imagery (representing urban, natural, technology and human examples) is a collection of archival footage. It has been shot in natural light and studio settings then edited into a multichannel installation. It displays refined production and cinematography. Authentic voices explore diverse subjective, cultural and academic constructs of time.







 ${\bf Zachary\ Lenior,\ } {\it Classless\ and\ Stoic}$

Painting, New England Regional Art Museum

Zachary's series of images interrogates the mythology of the suburban 'Australian dream' through a sequence of subtle and layered symbols. His work displays technical sensitivity in creating a dated photorealist style. He references Australian iconography: the Hills Hoist, double plugger thongs, Colorbond fence and grass backyard. The result is bleak, with fractured narrative inferences, uncut grass and inert legs, severed by the frame.







Yang Leon Zhong, Resurrection

Painting, Preselection

Conceptually, Leon's Body of Work reveals the forms of the swan and ballerina and the allusion to beauty and destruction, giving an audience meanings that can be interpreted in many ways. It references the work of Francis Bacon and the confident brushwork of Francisco Goya's *Black Paintings* series. A textured palette brings a strong emphasis to the forms, and the contrast of bold strong coloured and textured shapes allude to the dark nature of the theme. The subtle layering of paint and confident application pay homage to past historical styles and narrative storytelling.



Henry Lewis-Thorp, Remembrance

Drawing, Preselection

Henry's artwork represents proud, ageing men who have served their country, reflecting different emotional states to an audience – especially to those who have served in the armed forces. The facial lines give us an indication of the experiences they have endured. Each artwork reveals an exquisite and sustained drawing practice, matched with a deep understanding of the subjects. These drawings display a photorealist rendering of the faces and a sophisticated handling of the monochromatic tonal palette.









Minh Duong, Passerby

Painting, Preselection

Minh's four intricate paintings on board display scenes of people working and walking around train stations against the backdrop of ironic messaging from advertising billboards, discreetly conflicting with the subject's identity. The work shows a refined and sustained mastery of technique. The wet-on-wet blending has references to the

photographic compositional style of Edgar Degas' *Place de la Concorde*, and the isolated figures are charged with a nod to the mid-century paintings of Edward Hopper.

Scots Boys Unleash Their Creativity

To kickstart the week, the boys watched three stimulus videos which were made with boys and teachers from the Early Learning Centre, Junior Prep and Senior Prep. By the end of the week, they had written a final creative narrative.

Using their knowledge from Term 2's investigation on change, the ELC Lions boys planned to beautify both the fence and garden. With the help of ELC Art teacher, Ms Rebekah Golsby-Smith, and the College's gardeners, led by Mr Tim Andrews, the boys created giant wire flower sculptures and

planted native flowers - waratah, banksia and wattle.

The giant wire flower sculptures were inspired by the magical garden in Alice in Wonderland. Flowers and plants were selected for their colour and size.

A Maths Moment with Kevin Liu (Year 7)

I have always loved numbers. When I was younger, I enjoyed numbers and patterns, such as the Rubik's Cube, Sudoku and puzzles.

I started getting into problem-solving at about the same time as my brother. When I didn't know how to do a question, I would ask my parents for help.

Depending on how much time I have, I approach questions differently. If it's a test, I try to figure out how to do it. If I don't know how to do it, I return to it after I finish the rest of the questions. If I am just doing problems at home, I try them for a bit. If I don't know how to do it after a long period of time, I ask my parents or my brother.

I don't know the exact job I want to do, but I want to work with numbers more extensively.

A Maths Moment with William Liu (Year 9)

I enjoy maths' infinite possibilities. Its limitations and laws govern what we can and cannot do (for example, a triangle must have three sides), but we have freedom within these rules. The process, although sometimes frustrating, is fun when you look back at it.

I have always understood mathematical concepts quite quickly and easily. I wanted a way to apply the knowledge in a way that challenged me. This led me to problem-solving: a solution may require many steps, and it is this process that I find challenging and fun.

I start by writing out what I know and extract information from the question. The first few steps in a solution seem right, then you realise, at the last step, that the solution is invalid. So, I take a break and approach the question with a fresh mind.

After high school, I want to apply my skills to areas such as artificial intelligence and technological modelling. I want to help develop efficient and capable technology using maths.


Arthur Taylor (Year 10), Lost

College Assemblies, which were all held online, each featured a pre-recorded musical item. While our ensemble rehearsal schedule was disrupted, our Music community at the College banded together.



It was the first time that Scots had two representatives, Maliq Reed (Year 11) and Jeremy Zhang (Year 10), selected for the New South Wales Combined Independent Schools (CIS) Tennis team that would have competed at the NSW All Schools Tennis Championships. Unfortunately this event was cancelled due to the pandemic.

Scots Tennis also saw its second consecutive year of having three representatives in the Athletic Association of the Great Public Schools (AAGPS) Combined Tennis Teams. Maliq and Jeremy were selected for the AAGPS Combined 1st Grade Team, and Tom Buchanan (Year 12) was selected for the AAGPS Combined 2nds Team.

Finley Dyer (Year 8) continued to show his prowess in the AR Tournaments, taking out two titles (Gosford and Hobart) before COVID-19 forced the suspension of tournaments for 2020. Finley was also the youngest competitor for any school team at the Australian Schools Tennis Challenge held at the end of 2019.

Since 2019, The Scots College, partnering with four other Sydney schools, has established the Teaching Schools Alliance Sydney. The Alliance teaching model provides an immersive pathway for classroom teaching by delivering undergraduate and postgraduate teacher education degrees – embedded in schools and underpinned by a Christian worldview. One of our 2020 trainees, Tara Harman, reflects on her first year.

"My first year of study has been really eye-opening into the world of education, with many chances to overcome challenges and grow. The cadetship-style study approach has allowed me to be in a classroom from day one and be able to experience what that is really like once you are a teacher. This has been extremely helpful for my development while I study, as everything that is being taught to me within my university course I am then able to apply within the school classroom setting. The experience of COVID-19 has also given me the opportunity to overcome challenges; Zoom classes have been an example of an experience that I wouldn't have been able to obtain without being at Scots.

The boys who I have had the chance to meet and teach have been welcoming and have made me feel like a proper teacher. What inspired me to study teaching was the idea of wanting to help the next generation flourish, both academically and through the growth of their individual characters. When I reflect on my own Christian mentors, I realise they have been great teachers who have impacted me significantly. I want to replicate that experience for my students."
